SAINT MATTHEW RELIGIOUS EDUCATION MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Religious Education Program at St. Matthew Catholic Church is to look upon each child as created in the image and likeness of God and as a reflection of His goodness. Being a living witness to the Gospel will be central to the development of each student. Therefore, at Saint Matthew's, learning about Jesus and His message is essential to knowing Him, loving Him, and serving Him always. The core elements listed below form the foundation and strength of St. Matthew's Religious Education Program.

- ✝ **It is Christ, The Incarnate Word and Son of God, who is taught—everything else is taught with reference to Him—and it is Christ alone who teaches. (*Catechesi Tradendae* #6)**
- ✝ **The dignity of the individual, as a unique child of God, is nurtured and developed.**
- ✝ **Parents are recognized as the primary educators of their children.**
- ✝ **The doctrine of the Catholic Faith is presented in its fullness and entirety as both knowledge to be *learned* and a life to be *lived*.**
- ✝ **By His life and teaching, Jesus attested to the importance of keeping the Ten Commandments. The gift of the Commandments is the gift of God Himself and His holy will. (*Catechism of the Catholic Church* #2059)**
- ✝ **Life in the Sacraments is central in developing the Catholic Faith.**
- ✝ ***The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass* and the *Real Presence of our Lord in the Eucharist* is the center of our Faith.**
- ✝ **Weekly attendance at Mass and regular celebration of the Sacrament of Penance are essential.**
- ✝ **Class lessons are based upon the Deposit of Faith, the body of divine Knowledge revealed by God through Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition; we are guided in our understanding of divine revelation by the authentic teaching and interpretation provided by the popes and bishops.**
- ✝ **Prayer is a source for growth in the spiritual life; Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament with the praying of the Rosary take place at the start of every class to cultivate a life of prayer.**
- ✝ **Our Blessed Mother is the first disciple of Jesus and a model of holiness that the faithful should strive to imitate.**
- ✝ **The lives of the saints will be studied as examples of holiness.**

Purpose and Tasks of Catechesis

Catechesis is the word used to describe the essential ministry of the Church through which the teachings of Christ have been passed on to believers throughout the ages.

Catechists teach the faith, pointing always to Christ and His Truth, and form their students in knowledge and practice of our religion, through which we worship God. "Catechesis is that particular form of the ministry of the word which matures initial conversion to make it into a living, explicit and fruitful confession of faith" (National Directory for Catechesis, p. 54).

Catechesis comprises six (6) fundamental tasks to achieve its objective of formation of disciples of Jesus Christ:

- It promotes knowledge of the faith;
- It promotes a knowledge of the meaning of the Liturgy and the Sacraments;
- It promotes moral formation in Jesus Christ;
- It teaches the Christian how to pray with Christ;
- It prepares the Christian to live in community and to participate in the life and mission of the Church;
- It promotes a missionary spirit that prepares the faithful to be present as Christians in society

At the heart of catechesis we find, in essence, a Person, the Person of Jesus of Nazareth, the only Son from the Father. . .who suffered and died for us and who now, after rising, is living with us forever. To catechize is to reveal in the Person of Christ the whole of God's eternal design reaching fulfillment in that Person. It is to seek to understand the meaning of Christ's actions and words and of the signs worked by Him. Only He can lead us to the love of the Father in the Spirit and make us share in the life of the Holy Trinity.

In catechesis, Christ, the Incarnate Word and Son of God,. . . is taught--everything else is taught with reference to Him and it is Christ alone who teaches.

Parents' Rights & Responsibilities

"The Lord is entrusting to parents the growth of a child of God, a brother or sister of Christ, a temple of the Holy Spirit, and a member of the Church."

Familiaris Consortio, Pope Saint John Paul II Paragraph 39

Parents are the primary religious educators of their children. The home is the domestic Church and the place where a child first experiences the Catholic Faith. The family is where faith is learned, lived and nurtured. You teach primarily by the example you set. It is important for children to experience the love of God in their homes. The Religious Education program works in partnership with parents in order to assist them in living their vocations as educators of their children. This program should merely complement, not replace, the catechesis children receive in the home.

The Religious Education Program assists parents in their God-given role as educators of the Faith by:

- ✠ Providing the truth of the Roman Catholic Faith as revealed by God through Sacred Scripture, Sacred Tradition, and the Magisterium (teaching authority) of the Church, and explained by the Fathers and Doctors of the Church.
- ✠ Providing weekly religious education classes for children in a classroom setting or at home learning.
- ✠ Providing weekly homework that students and parents should work on together.

All Christian education finds its source within the sacramental life of the Church. Therefore, parents should assist their children by:

- ✠ Recognizing that it is of utmost importance that children are given the opportunity for attendance at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass every Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation, and regular participation in the Sacrament of Penance.
- ✠ Understanding that knowledge of the Catholic Faith that is not lived out by the practice of the sacramental life is empty knowledge.
- ✠ Making every effort to have your child attend class regularly at home or on-site.

Students' Responsibilities

Every student has the right and privilege to learn. Students should conduct themselves in a manner appropriate to a classroom environment. To foster that environment, all students will observe the Student Code of Conduct.

Student Code of Conduct

Students:

- ✝ Will be reverent during our period of Adoration
- ✝ Will be prepared for class
- ✝ Will complete assignments and participate in class
- ✝ Will be respectful and courteous toward all teachers, parents, and fellow students
- ✝ Will use appropriate language
- ✝ Will respect church property
- ✝ Will follow the dress code
- ✝ Will report to their teacher or Director of Religious Education anything that causes them or other students to feel unsafe
- ✝ Will not bring items that could in any way cause injury
- ✝ Will not bring food, drink, or gum to class
- ✝ Will not use electronic devices or cell phones during class-phones will be collected at the beginning of class but accessible in case of an emergency

Dress Code

- "Clothing free from inappropriate language or designs including that which is profane; images that depict, advertise or advocate illegal, violent or lewd conduct; or the unlawful possession or use of weapons, drugs, drug paraphernalia, alcohol, tobacco, marijuana or other controlled substances; or is discriminatory or derogatory about the body."

- Tight-fitting clothing, halter tops, tank tops, midriff shirts, spaghetti straps, or clothing that may be considered immodest dress should not to be worn. Hats, for gentlemen, must be removed upon entering the building

General Information

Class Arrival and Departure

Parents are asked to escort their children into the church and not drop them off at the curb. Please do not drop off or leave your child unattended in the parish hall if students are still in the church. All students **MUST** have a parent or guardian come to the classroom to pick up students at the end of class time. Siblings younger than high school age are not permitted to pick up students. **No student should ever be alone in the parking lot.**

Rosary, Adoration and Benediction

Ten minutes prior to the beginning of class the Rosary will be prayed. While this is not part of class, students are encouraged to come as this presents a wonderful opportunity for them to learn the Rosary.

ALL STUDENTS will take part in Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction for the first 10 minutes of their class. Each class will have assigned seating. Students who arrive late will sit in the last two pews at the back of the church with the Director of Religious Education and will join their class as students leave from the church.

After Benediction, the students will report to their classrooms with the catechist. Students will be dismissed from the classrooms at the end of class.

Absences

Faithful attendance at class is vital for a well-grounded understanding of the information provided. Absenteeism also harms the individual student and the morale of the class as a whole. Parents of students in the program in the past have set a fine example for their children by making class a priority.

Please keep your sick child home. They should be fever and symptom free for 24 hours prior to attending Religious Education.

Students who miss five or more of the scheduled classes without making up the work or do not complete their at home-study, may be required to complete remedial work over the summer.

Tardiness

Tardiness can be a serious disruption to the class. There is limited time allotted each week for classes, so please help us to help you by getting your child(ren) to class ON TIME each week. If a student arrives after opening prayers have begun, they will be seated in the back pew with the Director of Religious Education or Assistant. If you arrive late and the classes are still in the church, please bring your child to the church. **Never leave your child alone in the classroom.**

Classroom Discipline

Every student has the right to learn in a classroom where students are well behaved. Similarly, every catechist and assistant has the right to teach in such an environment. Students will exhibit proper behavior and respect authority in the classroom and on the premises. In the event that a student finds it difficult to exhibit proper behavior, the following course of correction will take place:

- ✚ The catechist will speak to the child privately and encourage a change in behavior.
- ✚ If the disruption persists, the catechist will call upon the Religious Education Director to speak privately with the child in order to integrate the child back into the classroom.
- ✚ If this is unsuccessful, the Religious Education Director will contact the parents and ask them to work with the child.
- ✚ If this attempt is not successful, parents may be required to home school for the remainder of the year.

“Under no circumstance may an adult engage in the physical discipline of a minor. It is the policy of the Diocese that corporal punishment of a child is prohibited in all entities under the auspices of the Diocese.

- However, this prohibition of corporal punishment shall not be deemed to prohibit,
- (i) the use of incidental, minor or reasonable physical contact or other actions designed to maintain order and control;
 - (ii) the use of reasonable and necessary force to quell a disturbance or remove a student from the scene of a disturbance that threatens physical injury to persons or damage to property;
 - (iii) the use of reasonable and necessary force to prevent a student from inflicting physical harm on himself”

In all cases, the parents will be notified of any correction by the catechist or Director of Religious Education.

Learning Disabilities/Health-Related Issues

If your child has a learning disability or health-related issue that would necessitate special consideration while attending religious education classes, please notify the Religious Education Office in writing or by entering the information on the registration form. All information will remain confidential but may be passed on to the catechist or aide to assist them in teaching your child.

Correspondence

Recognizing that the parents are the primary educators of their children, it is important that catechists communicate with the parents. In accord with the Diocesan Code of Conduct and Social Media Policy volunteers are not permitted to contact students directly and are not permitted to respond to any phone calls or social media contacts initiated by the student.

If you should need to contact your child's catechist or aide, please direct your communication to the Religious Education Office and we will promptly pass along your message. If you wish to communicate by email, please send the email to stmatthewre@comast.net and the Religious Education Office will be happy to forward the email.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Safety Monitor

Each class session will have safety monitors. They will ensure the children's safety from the moment the parents leave them at the front of the church until they are picked up at the classroom door. The safety monitors will be positioned in the parking lot and hallways of the building. They will enforce the following rules:

- No child should ever be alone in the parking lot. *This includes children of catechists.*
- No child should ever be alone in the hallway. Should a child need to use the restroom, the aide should escort the child to the classroom door and ask for assistance from the safety monitor. The safety monitor will walk the child to the restroom door and then escort the child back to the classroom.
- Children will be brought into the church by their parent and not dropped at the curb.
- Upon class dismissal and pick up at the classroom door, no child will be allowed to leave the building without a parent or guardian. Siblings younger than 9th grade are not to be considered guardians.
- Entrance and exit from the building will be via the front door only, unless an emergency situation requires exit by the nearest door.
- The doors to the building will be locked during class times and entry will be permitted by the safety monitors.

Cell Phones

“Use of cell phones is not permitted during youth events. Schools may allow the use of cell phones for educational and emergency purposes only.”

To ensure this policy is followed, we ask that all students leave their phones and smart watches at home or with you. If a cell phone/smart watch is brought, they will be collected at the beginning of class and placed in a container. This container must be accessible by the students in case of an emergency. Phones will be returned to the students at the end of class. Adult volunteers may have their cell phones on their person and use in case of an emergency.

Safety Standards

The safety and security of our parish children, volunteers, and staff are foremost in our minds. In response to an increase in school shootings and violence, Bishop Burbidge and a security task force composed of pastors, the Superintendent of Schools, principals, teachers, and experienced security professionals revised security standards for schools and parishes with youth gatherings. In addition, the parish clergy and staff met with the Spotsylvania County Sheriff's Office for a review of our facilities.

Classroom Locks

All classroom and meeting room doors have locks. Security can be greatly increased by adding locks to all rooms used for classes or youth meetings. All classroom or meeting doors need to shut properly and must have a functioning lock to be easily secured during a lockdown or when not occupied.

Safety Standards for Parishes with Youth Gatherings

Locks on classroom doors

- All doors will remain closed and locked during Religious Education classes.
- Locks will be on the inside of the door allowing the room to be secured during a lockdown.
- The door will open from the inside of the classroom even if the door is locked.
- The DRE or appointed staff will have a key to unlock the door.

Security Cameras

Surveillance cameras are located at all primary entrances to the facility being used by the youth (e.g. parish hall, school gym, etc.).

Surveillance cameras are in all large space areas, such as multipurpose rooms, meeting rooms, the gym, or the parish hall.

Safety Standards for Parishes with Youth Gatherings

- Cameras are in the parish hall entrances, hallways, and classrooms.
- Cameras record both video and sound.
- Camera footage will be saved for 60 days and then erased.
- The camera surveillance will be housed in a secure room with a limited number of staff authorized to view the footage.

Safety Drills

Fire drills will be conducted every year per diocesan policy. The DRE will also provide an Active Shooter Plan and walk through the plan with all volunteers. This will not be drilled with the students.

Health and Wellbeing

We ask that parents and guardians help us safeguard the health of our students and volunteers:

- Please keep your child home if they are feeling ill.
- Your child should be fever free for 24 hours prior to attending classes.
- Should your child become ill during class, we will isolate your child and call a parent for pick up. No medication will be administered.
- Should your child have an allergy that requires the administration of an epi-pen, a parent will be asked to remain on church grounds during class time. If that is not possible your child may have to be enrolled in our homeschool option.
- Please contact the Religious Education Office when in doubt

Circle of Grace

This year we will use a Diocesan program called Circle of Grace for our Youth Safe Environment Training for Grades 1-8.

Through *Circle of Grace*, adults assist children and youth to recognize that each of us lives within a Circle of Grace that holds our very essence in body, mind, heart, soul, and sexuality. ***Circle of Grace is not a sex education program, which the Diocese of Arlington reserves to parents.*** Children and youth are taught to identify and maintain appropriate physical, emotional, spiritual and sexual boundaries; recognize when boundary violations are about to occur; and demonstrate how to take action when boundaries are threatened or violated. *Circle of Grace* provides a strong parent component in which parents can actively participate in their children's education and formation.

Circle of Grace teaches:

- God's presence and assistance in difficult and confusing situations as an essential component in its K-12 curriculum
- A philosophy that can be used throughout the year as a concept that reinforces God's real presence in our lives, respect for ourselves and others, and skills for making good choices
- The sacredness of each person and how relationships are called to be experiences of divine love
- A holistic approach giving children and youth the skills to identify uncomfortable situations long before inappropriate touch occurs
- Children and youth to identify the "trusted adults" in their lives in addition to their parents

All classes will be taught as presented in the lesson plan with one lesson *and taught by the Director of Religious Education* on the dates indicated below. Copies of the lesson plans will be included in your parent folder.

Text Series

This year Grades K-5 will use *Word of Life* from Ignatius Press and the Augustine Institute. Sixth and Seventh Grade will continue to use the Faith and Life series. Eighth Grade will use a combination of *Chosen* by Ascension Press and Seton Confirmation textbook for Confirmation preparation.

The lesson plans utilize the Ecclesial Method developed by Msgr. Francis Kelly which is a comprehensive catechetical approach that is composed of five steps:

Preparation:

This step draws the student away from their daily distractions into a prayerful learning environment.

Proclamation:

The Proclamation is a succinct statement of Truth. It is the very topic of the lesson that week. The purpose of this step is to proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Explanation:

Once the proclamation is made, it needs to be further explained. This step is divided into four focus points. The lesson plan offers many activities and online resources to cover the essential material in the chapter.

Life Application:

This step encourages the student to apply what they have learned to the daily experiences of their life.

Celebration:

The lesson concludes with a celebration of our thanks and praise to God. This is normally done in the form of a closing prayer, story about a saint, or song.

Word of Life-Grades K-5 Ignatius Press & Augustine Institute

The Word of Life curriculum returns to the heart of the Christian faith: Jesus Christ. Jesus is the “word of life” (1 Jn 1:1). Through an engaging, prayerful, and conversational approach, the Word of Life curriculum equips catechists to bring students into a life-giving encounter with Jesus, the Word of life.

Word of Life Uses Four Golden Catechetical Threads

Salvation History

The curriculum is firmly rooted in Sacred Scripture and the history of salvation. Students will be immersed in the historical reality of God's entering time and inviting all people into communion with Him. They will go beyond simple knowledge of biblical persons, places, and events and will learn how to recognize and live from their place within this amazing narrative.

Christian Anthropology

The Word of Life series teaches students the truth about their identity, dignity, and purpose. Students will learn that it is by living in alignment with God's plan for us that we will find our greatest happiness here on earth and in eternity.

Heroic Virtue and Character Formation

Students will be presented with practical situations and concrete examples of virtuous and holy character. The series draws from the rich tradition of the Church to explain virtue in a way that is accessible enough for young minds to apply it to their lives. Students, parents, and teachers will all come to know ways to recognize virtue and live it in their daily lives.

Learning through Discipleship

Catechesis that shows why the faith matters and nurtures a deepening integration of the faith in daily life through Christian discipleship.

Learning Methods Integrated into Word of Life

Word of Life is written intentionally to provide catechists with an effective way of presenting the truths of each chapter. Many methods are incorporated to enhance comprehension for all styles of learners. These methods are integrated within the structure of each chapter.

Conversational Learning:

The Parish Catechist Manual provides engaging questions and clarifying statements.

Repetition:

Young minds absorb information through repeatedly hearing, seeing, and doing. The Word of Life series gives several opportunities throughout a chapter for repetition of key phrases and Scripture passages.

Memorization:

The Word of Life series provides short phrases (Proclamation) and Scripture verses that can be memorized.

Routine:

The ecclesial method provides a routine and structure for students. Knowing what to expect and what is expected of them allows children to feel more confident.

Hands-On Learning:

The series is filled with opportunities to integrate hands-on learning through chapter activities and bonus activities.


Real-World Practice:

Word of Life incorporates age-appropriate activities to help students learn reverent behavior, silent prayer, and the practice of virtue.

Word of Life

as four liturgical season lessons. Images used in each chapter range from photographs depicting a real-life situation, contemporary art depicting a Bible narrative, and sacred art that depicts an event in salvation history.

A list of vocabulary words for students to review is also included; digital flash cards can be found on the parent portal. These perforated pages are found at the end of each chapter in the Student Text and should be taken home after completion of each chapter. They are also on the parent portal.

Online Resources through the Parent Portal



The Word of Life parent portal provides built-in parent and family faith formation that supports parents in their important role as primary catechists of their children. Using both print and electronic media resources, Word of Life engages and enriches parents at varying levels of interest, knowledge, and formation. This portal gives access to the student videos, ideas for celebrating the

liturgical calendar at home, explanations of the sacred art found in the Student Text, and links to other important Catholic resources.

- Firmly and clearly forms in minds and hearts a deep sense of the loving covenantal relationship with God established by Jesus Christ in and through His Church and Sacraments.

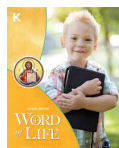

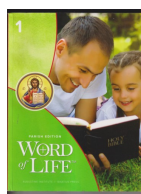
Grade K: God's Plan of Love

Theme

Kindergarten introduces God's plan of love as expressed in Scripture. It provides a groundwork for understanding the dignity of the human person and prepares your child for a deeper understanding of the faith in later grades.

Grade 1: God's Promise of a Savior

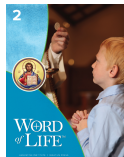
Theme

Establishes the overarching narrative of salvation history and come to understand that this history is our history as God's people. God's immense love for His children is revealed.

Students will learn the great lengths God has gone to in order to share His Life and love with us culminating in the coming of Jesus to save us from sin and establish the Church.

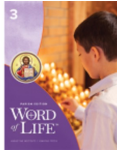
Grade 2: Salvation History: God's Presence in the Sacraments

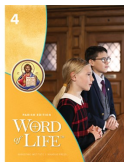
Grade 3: The Holy Spirit and the Life of Grace

Grade 5: Liturgy and Worship

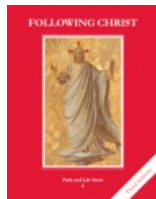
Theme

In Grade 5, The students will explore the beauty and meaning of the Catholic Church's worship of God. 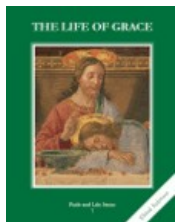
Sequence

Grade 7: The Life of Grace



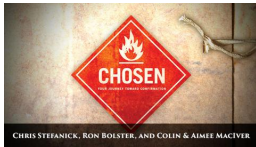
Theme

Grace as our link with God, his gift which brings us to himself and his eternal life, with an emphasis on transmission of grace through the seven sacraments; God's loving revelation of himself through the prophets, the Incarnation, and the Church; the role of grace in developing the virtues.

Sequence

- *Part 1: God Reveals Himself.* The revelation of God through creation, and the prophets, and to the chosen people.

- *Part 2:* God becomes Man. Jesus, true God and true Man, Priest and Sacrifice.
- *Part 3:* God Shares His Life. The operation of grace in our lives, in developing the virtues especially through each sacrament.



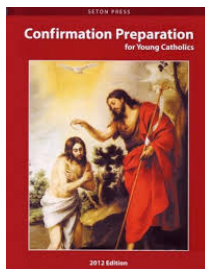
Grade 8: Chosen

Overview

Chosen for Confirmation candidates provides the essential intellectual and spiritual catechesis vital to sacrament preparation. The goal of this program is to bring about a personal experience with Jesus Christ. Each of the lessons invite the candidate to hear and then respond with faith to the voice of God. From creation all the way through salvation history, candidates will discover how the sacraments, prayer, and discipleship are the keys to a happy life.

Sequence

- *Part 1:* The Church. Christ's plan for the Church's structure and its necessary attributes; the Church's teaching authority.
- *Part 2:* The Christian in the World. Religious and laity, Holy Orders, Marriage, and family life; call to holiness.
- *Part 3:* Sacrament of Confirmation and the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit. Review the matter, form and effect of the sacrament.
